## From the Principal

Dear Parents and Caregivers,

Welcome back! I hope you all enjoyed the glorious weather over the holidays and that you had some time to relax with family and friends.

We are of course straight back into it! Finishing last term with Parent/Teacher/Student learning conversations, gave students a good basis for setting their learning goals for term 2. I encourage all of you to discuss with your child what he or she sees as their goals for this term and how you will support them at home to achieve their goals.

#### Soccer

Term 2 means Soccer! This year we have 5 teams competing against other local teams in the Noarlunga District Junior Soccer Association. A HUGE thank you goes to Kylie Vogt who is again co-ordinating all of these teams and liaising with the NDJSA regarding fixtures and association expectations. I also want to thank all of the parents who have stepped up to coach these teams and the parents who have offered to be team managers and support the coach and Kylie with the soccer season.

As there has been in the past, we will continue to host a BBQ for all home soccer games and the expectation is that parents take turns during the game to cook and serve sausages. There will be a roster drawn up for each team and we ask people to organise their own swaps if they are unable to help when rostered. In this way, we share the load and raise much needed funds for our soccer teams which will be spent on goalie uniforms, balls, referees etc. Your help with this BBQ is both needed and appreciated.

#### **Playground**

## From the APRIM

#### EMMAUS FEAST DAY - A GREAT REASON TO CELEBRATE!




Next Thursday 10<sup>th</sup> May, we will celebrate our Emmaus Feast Day. This is always a special day for our school community and a day we remember the important story from which our school receives its name - the story of the walk to Emmaus, from Luke's Gospel. In this story, we hear about two disciples who are traveling to the town of Emmaus about 15 km from Jerusalem, after Jesus had been crucified and had risen from the dead. Jesus joins them but they do not recognise him. It seems strange that they don't recognise Jesus. *But is it so strange? Do we always recognise Jesus in our busy lives?* 

Jesus explains the scripture to them and tells them about everything that has happened to Jesus including his death and resurrection but they still don't know who he is. Do we recognise God speaking to us when we hear the readings at Mass? Do we remember that Jesus is present at every mass we attend, in the people who are there, in the priest and in the bread and wine?

Jesus goes to walk on but the disciples ask him to stay with them. Later the disciples recognise Jesus when he breaks bread with them. Do we realise that Jesus is with us in the simple events in our daily life, as we walk to school, as we talk to friends, or as we share a meal with family and friends?

Jesus then disappears from their sight. The disciples quickly return to Jerusalem to tell the apostles and others about their experience. Do we have the courage to tell others about our faith and our beliefs? Do we talk to our children about faith and the importance of spirituality?



Emmaus Catholic School is certainly a community on a journey with Jesus. We see and experience the presence of Jesus all around us.

We invite all families to join us to celebrate our Feast Day whole school Mass on Thursday 10<sup>th</sup> May at 9.15am.





## SUPPORTING PROJECT COMPASSION IN 2018

As part of our Emmaus Feast Day activities, students will be completing our annual **Caritas Walk for Others**. ## EMMAUS HOUSE TEAMS

With the upcoming celebration of our feast day, it is a good opportunity to recall the origins of our house names. Our students take great pride in their house teams and it has proven to be a great system for strengthening the student community and providing leadership opportunities across the school. Each of our house teams gets its name from an important person or place. These people and places reflect the ideals that the Emmaus story describes...

## MacKillop House- Blue



The Sisters of Saint Joseph (founded by Saint Mary of the Cross MacKillop) first went to Morphett Vale in June 1870. They lived and taught in a cottage on the property of a parishioner. Later they moved into a convent (where Mary Help of Christians Church now stands.) Father Peter Hughes, parish priest at that time, lifted the sentence of excommunication from Mary MacKillop on 22nd February 1872 in the sacristy of the 'Old Church' at Morphett Vale Parish.

## McAuley House- Yellow



Catherine McAuley was the founder of the Sisters of Mercy. Catherine's concern for the marginalised was equalled by her wisdom and she intended that the wealthy would be brought into daily contact with the struggles of the poor. Two Sisters of Mercy continued the education of children in a Catholic School in Morphett Vale Parish. Sr Marita was the last Mercy Sister who was principal at Antonio School in the 1970s.

## Marin House- Green



Father Dean Marin was the parish priest who saw the needs of the children in a growing parish community and was instrumental in establishing another parish school—Emmaus. He suggested the name for our school—as we journey together with Jesus. Father Marin was thrilled to have a House named after him and wished to let the school community know 'how honoured' he was to be remembered in this way.

## Coolock House- Red



At Coolock House, in Dublin, Catherine McAuley gave catechetical instructions to household servants and the poor village children. Catherine's dream for her congregation of the Sisters of Mercy was for her sisters to: 'educate poor girls, to lodge and maintain poor young women who are in danger...and to visit the sick and poor. Coolock House, in the Morphett Vale Parish area, continues the work of Catherine McAuley today.

## Perhaps your child could benefit from this educational program to assist dealing with change and loss....

Seasons for Growth® is based on the belief that change and loss are part of life and grief is a normal response to these losses. Children, young people and adults need the opportunity to learn about how death, separation, divorce, chronic illness or other significant loss events may impact on their lives. The Seasons for Growth® program provides an opportunity for participants to learn the knowledge, skills and attitudes required to understand and respond well to such experiences. This is a small group program which meets during school hours, to:

- support children and young people to understand and respond well to the issues they experience as a result of death, separation, divorce or other significant change and loss in their lives
- ♦ assist children and young people to understand that their feelings and other reactions are normal
- ♦ develop skills for coping, problem solving and decision making
- ♦ build a peer support network
- ♦ help restore self-confidence and self-esteem
- ♦ educate children and young people about the grief process.

If you think your child would benefit from participating in a Seasons for Growth group, with our Chaplain Joy as their "Companion" talk to him/her about participating in the program.

## **Police Checks**

In 2017 the Catholic Church in SA foreshadowed changes to some of the arrangements relating to police checks for volunteers. These changes are consistent with moves across South Australia to align the volunteer police checking process more closely with recommendations arising from the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse.

## **Acceptable Forms of Clearances:**

Catholic Archdiocese of Adelaide—Police Check Unit (letter or card)

Department for Families and Social Inclusion—DCSI Child-Related Employment Screening (valid for 3 years);

Teachers Registration Board—South Australian TRB Certificate;

SA Police Officer—SAPOL Badge;

Licenced Bus Driver– Accreditation Card/Bus licence or company engagement documentation which states the driver is fully accredited by DPTI;

Licenced Security Guard (OCBA);

## People who must have a Police Check:

Parents/Guardians/Grandparents or anyone volunteering on a regular basis and on excursions. Students completing work experience at Emmaus.

Volunteers who come in occasionally and are supervised, e.g in the classroom with a teacher or assisting at a P&F event (under direct supervision of someone who has a Police Clearance), may do so without a Police Check up to 7 times in a calendar year.

Please note—National Police Certificates are no longer acceptable.

N.B. Applications generally take approximately 6 weeks to process, sometimes longer.

Would you please ensure if you have one of the acceptable clearances, that you bring this to the office for copying. Thank you

## Oz Rosary #53 Around Australia

In October 2017, on the Feast of Our Lady of Victory, later to be known as Our Lady of the Rosary, well over one million lay people gathered in Poland around the Polish borders to pray the Rosary for the protection of their country and to intercede for their young people.

Ireland then followed with well over thirty thousand lay people gathering at fifty-three venues around the country, many of them on the coastal beaches and hills overlooking the ocean.

The number 53 was chosen because there are 53 Hail Marys in the Rosary. After Ireland, Italy's coastal parishes organised the Rosary.

This GREAT SOUTHLAND of the HOLY SPIRIT NEEDS the Rosary

England and France are now organising their big Rosary events on the 28th and 29th April respectively.

Organisers in England already have over 160 groups volunteering to gather and pray on beaches, cliffs and in public places around the entire coast of the U.K.

On Sunday 13th May, Fatima Day, Australia will hold their own big national Rosary right around the country. A group of Sydney people under the patronage of Bishop David Cremin have been busy organising the event since November 2017.

Already many groups have registered on the Oz Rosary Facebook site to participate in the event. Rosary and prayer groups from Queensland, Canberra, Bathurst, Oberon, Greystanes, Cabramatta, Forbes, Tasmania, Adelaide and West Wyalong have registered to pray.

Many others have expressed interest in being one of the 53 venues or more to participate in the occasion.

We will be gathering from 4.00pm to 5.30pm to pray the Rosary in front of the Blessed Sacrament in Mary Help of Christians Church.
