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A smile is the universal Welcome

My younger days were spent in the outer suburbs of Melbourne although in those days large chunks of bushland separated the suburbs and they were more like separate villages than suburbs. We used to spend a lot of our time riding all over the neighbourhood, climbing through fences to get to the good yabbying dams and exploring the local creeks for treasure, especially when they were in flood. (I haven't told my mother about the time I fell through the debris into the flooded creek and luckily had my older, stronger brother there to grab my arm and pull me out before I disappeared, probably best that it remains with the other things I have neglected to tell her!)

When I left primary school, I went to an alternative high school that had no uniforms, used students to build mud brick buildings and shingled dome shelter areas, and had a policy of all staff being called by their Christian names. As our sport field was literally a field on the other side of the train tracks that required us to chase the cows away before a PE lesson and to dodge the manure during the lesson I never explored sport beyond the football that was virtually mandatory for all of us in our little suburban village.

I had some amazing learning experiences there; got to do things I had never done before and felt like a valued, important member of that community.

It was initially a bit of a shock to my system when I moved to Adelaide and arrived at a school that was much more traditional in its approach to rules, regulations and relationships. My mud brick making and shingling skills were not really of much value there. I did however discover that I could run quite fast, particularly if it was in a straight line and not too far, that I was not too shabby on a lathe and that I could develop relationships even though the staff were addressed more formally. I had the opportunity to participate in the more formal aspects of student leadership that this school offered.

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I got to experience two vastly different educational outlooks but what both offered for me were people who saw value in me, were prepared to put time and effort in to me but expected that I would fulfill my side of the bargain by giving as much as I received. That has been my experience all through life whether it was at school, university or when I was working behind a bar or in the greengrocers. Even when I left university part way through a building course, got on a train to Melbourne and got a job as a printer (my poor mother got a phone call from me saying, "Hi Mum, I have left Uni, I am in Melbourne and have got a job. I will let you know more when I work it out." How did she put up with me?) I was a bit lost and unsure of what I really wanted out of life and a wonderful man that I worked with sat and talked with me over many lunches and helped me clarify what I wanted to do with my life. I never really got to thank Dave for being such a wonderful mentor for me. Thanks to Dave and so many others I am doing what I really want to do, how lucky am I to have had so many inspirational people to support and guide me.

This year I have once again had the opportunity to experience a school quite different from the school I am currently in. It was much smaller than Emmaus and was very culturally diverse, 22 nationalities represented in a school of 90 children. What it had in common though was the very strong community feeling and the warmth with which it welcomed people into the community.

I would like to thank everybody for the warm welcome I have received on my return to Emmaus; it was like returning to home after an extended absence, I was blessed to have the opportunity to be a part of a different school community and equally blessed to be able to return to a school that places great value on welcome, personal connection and the support of all in our community.

We all have that role to play in the lives of those around us. Often we do not even realize that something we have said or done has had such a huge impact on a life. All we can do is put time and effort in to those around us and expect that they will fulfill their side of the bargain by giving as much as they receive.

TRANSFORMATION THROUGH PRAYER ...

"The Spirit comes to help us in our weakness. For when we cannot choose words in order to pray properly, the Spirit himself expresses our plea in a way that could never be put into words, and God who knows everything in our hearts knows perfectly well what he means, and that the pleas of the saints expressed by the Spirit are according to the mind of God." *Romans 8:26-27*

"Prayer has to do with breathing. The way we were taught to pray was almost exclusively cerebral. We confined our prayer to inside the shell of the cranium. It is conceivable that one can have thousands of holy thoughts and holy words about God within one's mind and yet be totally away from God. Sometimes people pray the prayers that they have learned. Because these prayers are so often said by rote, the heavy ideology and perceptions that are hidden in their phrases are seldom noticed.

Prayer makes a clearance. It is the liberation of God from our hungers, needs, and images. Prayer allows God to be God. And prayer also allows our secret selves to be themselves. This is a recommendation that Meister Eckhart makes again and again: be who you are. This is one of the great spiritual duties.

To pray is to come into presence. It is about leaving the heavy emotional, cognitive, and ideological baggage outside the door. When you sit down and come into the presence it is then that you are most yourself. This presence is the nearest thing to us.

In being yourself completely, you clear the clutter and accretions that have formed around your emotions, spirit, and mind. In being yourself, your original essence can approach the place it came from, that is, God.

Maybe this is the ground for the union of which the mystics speak. God would no doubt love to unite with you as you are now; but there are some protrusions in his way, he cannot therefore embrace you completely. Prayer is about clearance. Prayer is attention and gathering. You attempt to free yourself for this natural and primal union with God the Source.

When a well awakens the mind, new possibilities begin to flow, and you find within yourself a depth and excitement that you never knew you had. This art of awakening is suggested by the Irish writer James Stephens, who said,

"The only barrier is our readiness."

We often remain exiles, left outside the rich world of the soul, simply because we are not ready. Our task is to refine our hearts and minds. There is so much blessing and inner beauty near us that is destined for us, and yet it cannot enter our lives because we are not ready to receive it. The handle is on the door; only we can open it."


